

ART GALLERIES

Around ten years ago we were introduced to Gagosian and delivered their Picasso exhibition. Westgreen's ability to delivery fast track fit-out coupled with high end quality aspirations met the arts project delivery needs perfectly. We have maintained excellent relations with Gagosian ever since, delivering numerous projects for them as well as other galleries such as Pace, Blain|Southern, Cristea Roberts Gallery and Galerie Thaddadeus Ropac. Westgreen are often referred to as London's 'go-to' art gallery contractor. This niche has proved an exciting environment to work within and one that has introduced us to the arts world.

ART EXHIBITIONS / FABRICATIONS

Related to our gallery work, we have delivered (and sometimes designed) a number of art exhibition and art pieces. Most notably, we have worked with the internationally renowned artist James Turrell, fabricating a number of pieces of his working art forms. With all of our projects, when engaging Westgreen you experience intelligent and dedicated delivery with a 'can-do' attitude. We seek to build projects and in doing so, develop long term relationships with client and consultant teams.

HIGH END RETAIL

We have had real success in delivering high end retail projects for some of the big retail names of the West End such as; The Row, Zegna, ETRO, Holly Hunt and Jessica McCormack. The Westgreen team enjoy the fast pace delivery of retail projects and delivering on-time. To date we have undertaken individual retail projects up to £5m in value — but equally have delivered a £1m project in 10 weeks. One of our most recent fast track, high-end retail stores was for The Row, consisting of approximately 7,500 sq ft.

HIGH END / SUPER PRIME RESIDENTIAL

Residential projects typically ranging from £5m to £30m. Our largest scheme to date was a 30,000 sq ft single dwelling super prime residence with a build value of £32m — this has been successfully delivered and if of interest, site visits may be available, subject to a Non-Disclosure Agreement (NDA). We have undertaken many projects of this nature within prestigious residential areas of London (and occasionally beyond). We fully understand the balance between price, programme and quality and the finesse required in delivering a first class home.

BESPOKE RESTAURANTS

We were originally entrusted with the delivery of the full refit of The River Café and still enjoy a great relationship with The River Café client team, including Ruth Rogers. More recently we were entrusted with delivering The River Café's additional pastry kitchen and we have recently completed Vardo, a restaurant project for Cadogan Estates at Duke of York Square just off the King's Road. This has been followed by the new Humble Pizza restaurant, located on the Kings Road. We have enjoyed being integrated into restaurant projects and experienced complete success in this field. With a strong relationship still standing with The River Cafe team, we undertook a refurbishment to the staff areas in late 2019, with later works to provide an additional dining area in 2020.

OFFICE FIT-OUT

We have delivered many interesting and creative office spaces within several of our projects, especially in the commercial, gallery and retail sectors, where office and meeting facilities are provided for staff and back of house functions. We very much enjoy the challenge of delivering functional and productive spaces and creating open, light and visually pleasing offices that not only meet operational requirements but encourage and enlighten the use of a pleasant and ergonomic working environment.





Part sculpture, part garden folly, the artisanship that is to be found in the handmade ceramics of her home city of Lisbon are flamboyantly on display in the latest site-specific public work by Portuguese artist Joana Vasconcelos.

Prominently sited on the site within a glade formed by ancient trees on the Waddesden Manor estate, this 12m high ornamental work takes the form of a traditional tiered wedding cake. The three levels feature hand-painted glazed ceramic tiles to all faces and access is via a helicoidal staircase. Key light, wall wash and fibre optics complete the work.

Westgreen have enjoyed a longstanding creative association with Atelier Joana Vasconcelos. Together with VerdeOeste, our sister company in Portugal, we have been on hand to provide construction expertise throughout the process, with fabrication taking place in Lisbon and assembly by our Special Projects team in the UK.









Artist Sumayya Vally collaborated with Artist Alvaro Barrington to design a pyramid-shaped pavilion for Notting Hill Carnival, symbolizing the carnival's role as a diasporic gathering for London's Afro-Caribbean community. The incomplete structure, with four fragments carried in the parade and assembled during the event, draws inspiration from significant buildings in Notting Hill, including The Tabernacle and the historic Mangrove restaurant.

Following our introduction at Gagosian Social Works, Sumayya Vally approached Westgreen seeking support for the project, sponsored by Alvaro Barrington. Westgreen contributed by offering budgetary guidance, design expertise, programming advice, and sourcing necessary resources to successfully deliver the project.

Design and fabrication company Millimetre crafted the four-piece sculptural installation, the pyramid structure comprising over 160 drawings, utilised CNC machined parts and laminated ply for varied geometric forms.

Five storey high timber sculpture

On 30 September 2006 Antony Gormley's Waste Man was burned to the ground in front of an audience of thousands in the seaside town of Margate. The resulting film, Exodus, a modern retelling of the biblical story by Penny Woolcock, was broadcast on Channel 4 in 2007.

As part of a multi-discipline team Westgreen worked directly with the artist and film producer to create the sculptural finalé to the film. The five-storey high timber sculpture had to be structurally sound, safe and practical in construction but then ignite, burn and collapse in accordance with the artistic vision.








Having worked on a range of Turrell installations over the years, Westgreen deployed our most experienced art fabrication team to undertake the installation of this piece from James Turrell's 'Constellation' series as the centrepiece within a domestic setting.

Being as the project was to be carried out in an occupied and dressed family home, considerable care in accommodating artist, gallery, and client expectations was required in order to deliver a seamless result.

Constellation series pieces are works programmed with latitude and longitude positioning data so as to be sitespecific in behaviour, quietly cycling through the colour spectrum.




Tate Modern and Hyundai Motor selected Danish collective SUPERFLEX to undertake the 2017 Hyundai Commission for the Turbine Hall, which opened to the public in October 2017.

SUPERFLEX conceived "One Two Three Swing!" which is made up of three sections: "apathy", "production" and "movement". "Movement" consists of three-person swings connected by a line of orange-coloured beams that snake around the space before reappearing outside-it is the first time a Turbine Hall commission has gone beyond the museum's walls.

Tate and the artist's team were looking for a proactive design and build contractor with art-specific expertise. Westgreen were selected by competitive tender and interview to work closely with the artists and Tate Modern curatorial team to develop the design through to a safe and certified installation suitable for intimate public engagement and to source the various specialists required.

The structures evolved through collaborative engagement with all contributors which included a series of design workshops with sophisticated structural modelling. Westgreen had swing structures and seating prototyped, structurally and safety tested and finally put to use by the artists and Tate's team prior to full fabrication by their sourced specialist in Portugal.




Working with long-standing client Pace Gallery and our design colleagues Westgreen Studio, we fast-tracked this gallery turnaround for Leo Villareal's Nov 2019–Jan 2020 exhibition.

The goal was to construct a seamless free-standing wall to support the substantial LED artworks. This required a high degree of co-ordination in setting out twelve bespoke steel frames whilst also allowing access to a patchwork of electrical panels to service the installation.







The delivery of this job demanded fast-track work running through day and night. One of the main features is the 73 sqm wall that was specially prepared to the high standards required to receive the artist's large scale vinyl artworks. Advance samples were prepared for the artist's approval, who followed the whole process closely. A new central pod was also built to accommodate a film projection.

As with all our work for Pace in Burlington Gardens, the project was accomplished within the demise of the Royal Academy, with Westgreen working deftly within their constraints around public and staff.


Ground and installation

Over the course of three months Westgreen coordinated all works for the installation of the 'Lafite' artwork at Waddesdon Manor, including multiple meetings with the artist and representatives of Waddesdon Manor/RF.


During an installation period of four working days, Westgreen worked alongside Waddesdon Manor staff for the preparation of grounds and installation of 'Heli Piled' Foundations for Joana Vasconcelos commissioned art work at Waddesdon Manor for Baron Rothschild and the National Trust.

Lafite consists of metal frame in the shape of candlesticks with some 500 empty Chateau Lafite wine bottles with fibre optic lighting installed on each piece. These have been installed on the main driveway to the Main House and will be on display for the next five years.

The work opened to the public on 16th April, 2015.

Shooting at Hunger by Ghanaian artist Serge Attukwei Clottey presents ideas around hunger, food scarcity, preservation, and the personal impact of a changing planet.

Shooting at Hunger takes the form of a vibrant yellow Kufuor gallon, a colourful container used in Ghana for storing and transporting water and food.

Using discarded plastics found near his home of Accra, Ghana, Clottey shapes, cuts, weaves and binds refuse into large-scale sculptural installations, designed to engage viewers with issues that impact communities around the world.




A fast-track technical fit-out, this project also sees the appointment of Westgreen Studio to provide the detail design, which features two Tall Glass and two Wide Glass installations.

Completed on schedule, the event sees our association with Pace and Turrell extend to five projects in five continents.












Dan Colen's solo exhibition 'Sweet Liberty' opened in October 2017 at Newport Street Gallery. Our reconfiguration of the exhibition spaces was scheduled on a seven day working week, with Newport Street Gallery in occupation throughout.





The exhibition totals eight art pieces (including six new works), and explores the role of digital technology in transcending the physical and conceptual boundaries that exist between different artworks, with imagery from one work breaking free of the frame and entering the space of another.

The installations also dissolve distinctions between artwork and exhibition space, and involve the viewer through interactivity.

Westgreen constructed three exhibition spaces within the main gallery for these immersive installations, including walls, flooring, power and lighting.

Lucy Montgomery, Cowie Montgomery Architects Westgreen completed this refurbishment of Ely House for Galerie Thaddaeus Ropac in April 2017. This is Galerie Thaddaeus Ropac's first space in London, adding to their four gallery spaces in Salzburg and Paris.

This unique Grade-I listed building is situated in Dover Street, a location in Mayfair that has a long history of art and gallery dealerships. Built in the 18th century for the Bishop of Ely, the property is spread across five main floors, with over 16,000 sq ft of elegantly proportioned rooms and a grand feature staircase.

The project was designed by the New York-based Selldorf Architects and Cowie Montgomery Architects. This is Westgreen's seventh gallery space in Mayfair and our second project undertaken with Selldorf Architects.


Westgreen undertook refurbishment of the basement, mezzanine floors and mansard roof. Many new structural walls have been built to hang art, with the addition of fine flooring and bespoke lighting.







Externally, a new landscaped courtyard garden on Cork Street Mews will additionally create a new space for the presentation of outdoor sculpture.



The Gilbert & George Centre involves the conversion of a 19th century former brewery into a new non-profit public art gallery and foundation for contemporary art. The project ultimately consists of three separate exhibition areas with caretaker accommodation.


The 602m2 scheme is set in one of East London's most vibrant and diverse areas. The historic brewery building dates back to c1830 and is set in a secluded and leafy courtyard. The roof of a further structure from the 1970s was removed to enable the creation of a double height exhibition space suitable for the large-scale creations of the artist.

The brewery's original slate roof tiles have been reinstated, along with interior timber cladding and sash windows. Walls were restored or rebuilt using London stock and outside, the cobblestone courtyard has been restored. Westgreen also underpinned to form a new basement, with all levels being wheelchair accessible.

Since completion in 2023, The Gilbert & George Centre has been nominated for three prestigious awards - AJ Architecture Awards 2023 (Cultural Project), Brick Awards 2023 (Public), and the Civic Trust Awards 2024.

In the spirit of philanthropy, the gallery is entirely funded by Gilbert & George, with access free to all.



Westgreen were appointed as the Main Contractor to fitout this new private gallery in St James' Square, Mayfair.

A logistically challenging job, carried out in a 16 week construction period, incorporating a developing design, was completed and opened as required in time for Frieze.

The works incorporated solid Dinesen oak hardwood floors, partitioned walls with full height integral pocket doors, with specialist lighting and blinds controlled via Lutron. Specialist joinery was fitted to non-exhibition areas and the space fully air conditioned utilising linear diffusers.

Gagosian's new flagship Mayfair gallery is an 18,000 sq ft exhibition space in the heart of Mayfair, set in a location with a rich heritage of antique dealers and international auction houses. Being the third gallery opened by Gagosian in London, this new space is a considered layout of public and private viewing galleries, offices and library space.

Floor to ceiling perimeter walls conceal all M&E services within service and access voids. The doors to these voids (which are also floor to ceiling), are seamless between windows and walls, incorporating recessed blind boxes with floor to ceiling automated fabric blinds.

Artificial illumination mimics in real time the daylight levels in terms of brightness and coloration. This is achieved by a sensor controlled LED system located on the roof, which can be overridden and also monitored and controlled by lighting specialists in Germany with whom we have collaborated on a number of times at James Turrell projects.

Another feature of the project is the oak block flooring, which demanded a precision installation. The floor is comprised of 38,000 individual oak end grain up blocks selected from 50,000 and laid with alternating grain to a millimetre perfect gradient glued to varied layers of birch faced plywood over a sub floor.

700mm removable walls were also integrated, making it possible to adjust the space arrangement to suit and accommodate different exhibitions.












Designed by RIBA Stirling Prize nominated Architects 6a, and featured in the December 2017 edition of El Croquis, the project involved Westgreen undertaking the conversion of an existing Victorian warehouse into a suite of galleries and an archival space for a private contemporary art foundation.

The design sought to conserve the character of the threestorey building, whilst upgrading the interiors for the needs of a modern art gallery and archive space, including provision of features necessary to permit future public access.

The mews dig out was undertaken in tight constraints with the first phase descending 1.9m to pile the complete perimeter. The slab was cast and temporary works installed, with underpinning to double basement level while simultaneously working up the structure.

Adding six courses to the parapet raised the ceiling height internally, ensuring the top floor was better suited to receive art. The timber frames of the fenestration were restored and refurbished with thermally performing slim double glazing.


The gallery is refurbished to a high level internally. It provides the client with three galleries, an office with library, a sizeable and versatile archive, staff facilities, storage and plant rooms, bathrooms and kitchen.

A double height mezzanine entrance allows light into the depth of the building. To one side, a further double height area descends to the basement archive and viewing room. Both areas make for practical use of art hoists at ground and first floor level. The art store at basement level is in exposed concrete, with the ceiling, soffit and beams cast to drawing. The floors are polished concrete. All archive storage units and racks are moveable on tracks and rails.


The design introduces a new cantilever-hung stair in pre-cast concrete over four floors. With a cadence both perpendicular and tangential, the treads and risers to each landing are individual, with each landing averaging 2.4 tonnes and crane-hoisted into position.


The elegant balustrades are in nickel silver topped with an oak handrail, and were fitted in sections following a 3D survey. The lower basement stairs (which lead to the plant room and climate control units) were cast on site, along with the basement slab. In addition to the stairs, a 2,000kg lift over four floors provides additional accessibility. The lift is oak-lined with a mosaic tiled floor and artist inlay.




The scope of works called for the remodelling of the interior space from its current use as a noted gallery, with the introduction of offices to the ground floor level. This included demolition works of the existing steel staircase, and the infilling of the staircase void.

A new private gallery space was formed as part of the reconfiguration of the building across an 8 week fast track programme. M&E, including new security services were introduced with particular attention to lighting alterations. The reception area was relocated to serve the new layout and full height partitioning formed, creating an open office environment allowing the maximum amount of light transfer throughout the office space. New joinery and doors were introduced, and a particular feature are the 3.5m high doors.

Maureen Paley has been a pioneer in exhibiting contemporary art in London's East End for many years. Completed in autumn 2020, the new space at 60 Three Colts Lane retains the gallery's long-standing connection with the local area.

The client had a very clear idea of their requirements, and together with Westgreen's creative team, the design was evolved to result in a suite of exhibition spaces with full back-of-house amenities.

The gallery's relocation was an opportunity for the client to explore the latest in lighting technology – in this case, a versatile combination of tablet-controlled LED strips and Erco spots, allowing for multiple lighting configurations.

Exposed concrete floors and ceilings, together with exposed services, complete the aesthetic, and make for a raw counterpoint to the otherwise 'white wall' environment.




Westgreen have collaborated with the ICA on the refurbishment of their space at The Mall in the heart of London. These works are a part of a masterplan aiming to optimise the available space and to reveal details of the original building and the refurbishment works dated from the 1960s.

A good part of the intervention consists of soft strip works and reconfiguration of spaces. The works carried out have allowed ICA to move their book shop to a more prominent position by the reception and public entrance, as well as creating a new KIOSK space and a refurbished café, all located on the lower ground floor.

The client is engaged in a long-term transformation where interventions will be carried out over time, keeping the centre open as usual for visitors.
